Identifying the Unrelated Sentence

All the sentences in a paragraph should relate to its main idea. The main idea may be stated in a topic sentence. The supporting sentences give details about that idea. If a sentence does not relate directly to the main idea, it should be removed.

Notice how all the sentences in the following paragraph work together. The first sentence is the topic sentence. It tells readers that the Internet helps travelers. Sentences 2, 3, and 4 give details about ways the Internet helps.

The Internet can be a great help in travel planning. Within minutes you can buy discount airline tickets. You can reserve a room at a hotel. Some sites even offer dollars-off coupons for attractions you might enjoy.

In the next paragraph, the main idea is not directly stated. However, all the sentences except one tell about Travis's bad experience this morning. The underlined sentence does not develop that main idea. It should be removed.

Travis remembered why he hated city driving. First, he got stuck in a traffic jam on the freeway. Travis drives a compact car. Getting off at the wrong exit, he became lost on one-way streets. When he got to his building, there was no place to park. Next time, he will take the bus.
