

Identifying an Unrelated Sentence

The Chandler Company treats its employees well. The salaries are generous, and each employee receives a bonus at holiday time. Everyone who works for the company gets full health benefits. Theresa started working at Chandler's last year. The company even provides an excellent day care center, which is available to the children of all employees.



As you read the paragraph above, you probably noticed that the content of the underlined sentence stood out from the rest. Although it touched on the same topic, the Chandler Company, it was not related to the paragraph's main idea, the ways in which the company treats its employees well.

When you compose a paragraph, make sure each sentence belongs in the paragraph. You may want to begin with a topic sentence that states the main idea. As you write, stay focused on the main idea. Avoid adding sentences that do not support it or describe it more fully. After you write a paragraph, review it carefully to be sure that every sentence relates clearly and obviously to the main idea.
